The requirements listed below reflect the undergraduate major curricular changes approved by the Catalog Subcommittee since approval of the last Undergraduate Major Change Bulletin. All changes are underlined. Deletions are crossed out. The column to the far right indicates the date each change becomes effective. Note: Items marked {S} have been streamlined and do not require Catalog Subcommittee review.

Digital Technology and Culture (WSU Pullman/Tri-Cities) and Creative Media and Digital Culture (WSU Vancouver) New certificate in Game Studies and Design	Certificate in Game Studies and Design  The Game Studies and Design Certificate prepares students for conceptualizing and producing video games and gameful environments with a special focus on genres such as educational, serious, and games for change. Completion of the Game Studies and Design Certificate requires a total of 15 credits. Students are required to complete DTC 476 and 492, plus 9 credits chosen from one of two options. Students who select the <i>Design Option</i> select three courses (9 credits) from DTC 335, 336, 354, and 435. Students who select the <i>Development Option</i> select three courses (9 credits) from DTC 338, 355, 477, and 478.	
Electrical Engineering and Computer Science New minor in Software Engineering	Software Engineering  The minor in Software Engineering consists of 20 credits from CPT S 121, 122, 223 (or CPT S 131, 132, 233) and three 300-400-level courses chosen from CPT S 321, 322, 422, 476, 478, 484, or 487. A maximum of 8 course credits from the requirements of the student's major can be used to satisfy the requirements of the minor. 9 hours must be 300-400-level courses taken in residence at WSU or through WSU-approved education abroad or educational exchange courses.	8-17

# Hospitality Business Management Change title of minor in Wine Business Management; revise requirements for minor in Wine Business Management

## Wine and Beverage Business Management

To be eligible to certify in the wine <u>and beverage</u> business management minor, students must be certified in a major, have completed 60 credits, and have a cumulative GPA of 2.5.

Completion of the minor requires an overall GPA of at least 2.5 in the required courses. The required courses are ACCTG 230;

<del>COMSTRAT 312, COMSTRAT 380, or MKTG 477;</del> FRENCH 420; <u>HBM 231, 350, 358, 490;</u> MKTG 360; <u>HBM 350; ENTRP 490 or FS 422</u>. Nine hours must be 300-400-level courses taken in residence at WSU or though WSU-approved education abroad or educational exchange courses. Up to 6 hours may be transferred from another institution.

In addition, students must complete 400 hours of internship/industry experience to earn the minor. In order for hours to count for the requirement, they must meet the following criteria:

- 1. Hours must be worked after high-school graduation;
- 2. All hours must be documented as paid;
- 3. Hours must be worked at a company whose primary source of revenue is derived from hospitality services; and
- 4. The employer evaluation for the hours must reflect an

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average of 80% across the ratings criteria on the form.

### **Hospitality Business**

Management Change title of Bachelor of Arts in Hospitality Business Management – Wine Business Management major; revise graduation requirements

### Wine <u>and Beverage</u> Business Management (120 Hours)

To be eligible for certification as a major in wine and beverage business management, students must have earned at least 60 semester hour of credit and completed the following certification courses with a GPA of 2.50 or higher: ACCTG 230, 231; B LAW 210; MGTOP 215; ECONS 101, 102; ENGLISH 101; MATH 201, MATH 202; MGTOP 215; MIS 250, and have a WSU cumulative GPA of 2.5. All students must apply for certification on-line. Students will also be ranked based on space availability and academic performance. Students are eligible to petition for consideration of alternative criteria.

All students majoring in hospitality business management must complete at least 60 credit hours of their course work outside of the College of Business. MGTOP 215 may be counted as four credits towards this requirement. 1,000 hours of work experience is also required by the School of Hospitality Business Management.

### **Graduation Requirements**

A minimum cumulative GPA of 2.5 in all Carson College of Business (CCB) courses required for the major is required for graduation. The calculation will only count WSU business courses that are taught by the CCB including HBM courses. Economic Sciences courses or any other courses outside the college are not included.

In order for the 1,000 hours of work experience to count for the requirement, they must meet the following criteria:

- 1) Hours must be worked after high-school graduation
- 2) All hours must be documented as paid
- 3) Hours must be worked at a company whose primary source of revenue is derived from hospitality services
- 4) The employer evaluation for the hours must reflect an average of 80% across the ratings criteria on the form

Residence Requirements: 1) At least 50% of business core and major specialization course requirements must be taken at WSU; 2) At least nine 300-400-level business, economics, or hospitality courses must be taken in residence at WSU; and 3) The last 30 hours of course work must be taken at WSU.

Transfer, correspondence, and independent study credit (within university limits on these credits) may count toward the 120 hours required for the degree and/or satisfy requirements other than major courses.
